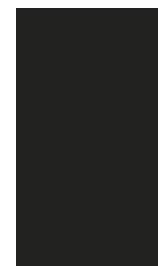
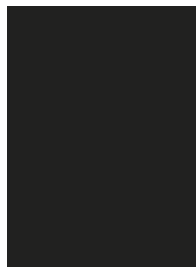


Executive Director Announcement

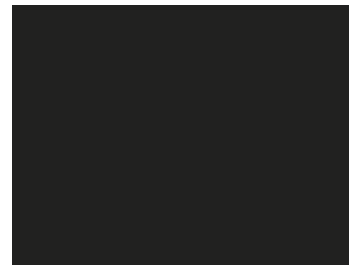

A 2021 Update

"Everyone then who hears these words of mine and does them will be like a wise man who built his house on the rock. And the rain fell, and the floods came, and the winds blew and beat on that house, but it did not fall, because it had been founded on the rock." (Matthew 7:24-25)

This verse, our theme for 2021, is part of a comparison between two houses; one built on a foundation of sand, and one on an unshakeable foundation of rock. When put to the test, and faced with the winds and waves, only one withstood the force of the storm.

While this teaching from Jesus may serve as a time-tested construction principle, He has more in view than offering building advice to the crowd gathered around. Instead, each house represents a life, and the one that withstands the storm is the one built on the solid foundation—Jesus Christ.

To borrow this image from Scripture—with Christ as the foundation, God continues to build the house, brick by brick to make us more like Him and bring Him glory. Time away at camp represents one of those "bricks" that He uses, as teaching from God's Word, conversations with counselors, worship and relationships impact the lives of campers and staff. This past year has been full of stories and examples of how God used camp to draw sinners to repentance, and believers further in their walk with Him; you will see a few of them highlighted throughout this letter. We are thankful for the bricks that were laid, the steps taken and the lives changed for the glory of God!
